Maintain Our Parks

Garden Keeper

Adopt a landscape bed at your favorite Metropark. Duties include planting, plant care, weeding, edging, and additional tasks needed to keep the ornamental beds in tip top shape.
Spring—Fall; Various parks

Stewardship Volunteer

Participate in restoration projects throughout the park district. Stewardship Projects include removal of invasive plants, prairie seed gathering and tree planting. Programs including Land Stewardship Work Days, Global Youth Service Day and Make a Difference Day.
Year round; Various parks

Park Clean Up Aide

Help keep Metroparks clean and green by participating in the care and preservation of the parks. Projects include trail maintenance, gardening, green house plant care, playground upkeep, painting, and general park cleanup. Join us throughout the year at Global Youth Service Day, Make a Difference Day, or volunteer on your own as your schedule permits. Individuals and groups welcome!

Native Seed Nursery

Help operate the native seed nursery while learning more about native plants through this hands-on experience. Activities include transplanting, weeding, seed cleaning and seed collecting.

Trail Steward

Help maintain your favorite trail at Oak Openings Preserve. Trail Stewards commit to walking their assigned trail on a regular basis and keeping it trimmed back according to trail standards.

Window on Wildlife

Volunteer to maintain one of Metroparks Windows on Wildlife. Duties include filling and cleaning feeders, washing finger and nose prints off the windows, and general upkeep of both the inside and outside of these facilities.

Educating Our Visitors

Manor House Docent

Share the history and beauty of Wildwood Preserve's Manor House as a Docent for public tours.

Garden Ambassador

Introduce park visitors to the gardens located at Toledo Botanical Garden or The Shipman Garden located at Wildwood Preserve. Garden Ambassadors will welcome visitors, provide visitors with garden locations, welcoming scheduled tours, get guest started on self-guided tours, answering questions about the gardens, and assisting with garden bed identification.

Facility Host

Facility Rental Host volunteers are needed to show off the Metroparks rental facilities during monthly open houses.

Roving Interpreter

Share your love of the outdoors with others. Volunteers use exciting interpretive materials to educate park visitors about the wide variety of plants and animals that make their homes at Metroparks. *Year round; Various parks & out in the community*

Volunteer Trail Patrol

While walking or biking Metropark trails, these dedicated volunteers answer questions for park visitors and identify any potential issues they may see while they are patrolling.
May - April; Various parks

Walk Leader

With guidance and training from Metroparks staff, these volunteers walk the beautiful Metropark trails while leading interpretive nature walks for area schools and the general public.

Monitoring Our Natural Resources

Bat Monitor

Using a device called the Anabat, volunteers are able to record and hear bat echolocation as they walk through various Metroparks. These sound recordings can be used to identify bat species active in the area.
June - August; Various parks

Monitoring Our Natural Resources

Breeding Raptor Monitor

Search for signs of hawks, owls and other raptors in the Oak Openings Region. On designated dates throughout the season, volunteers survey and record raptor occurrences.

March - May; Oak Openings

Butterfly Monitor

Butterfly Monitors will assist with locating and identifying butterfly species. This effort is part of a larger, statewide long term monitoring project in which data can reveal long term population trends.

April - October; Various parks

Cavity Nesting Birds Program

Help Metroparks keep tabs on cavity nesting bird populations. Monitor nesting boxes on Metroparks property, check your box(es) weekly, record your findings and report the data to staff.

April - August; Various parks

Frog Survey

Learn to distinguish frogs simply by hearing their calls. Team up with a fellow volunteer or two to participate in this night time count of breeding frog and toad species.

March through May; Oak Openings Preserve

Plant Monitor

Assist with locating, identifying, measuring and counting rare plant species within Metroparks in order to maximize efforts to protect these species and their habitats.

April - September; Various parks

Water Quality Monitor

Assist staff in the use of biological monitoring to determine the water quality of streams and rivers in and near Metroparks.

May through October; Various parks

Assisting With Programs

Counselor in Training (CIT)

Teens ages 14-18 have the opportunity to develop leadership skills, earn service hours and gain experience in outdoor education while interacting with campers ages 3-15. Recruitment is January-March.

Summer; Various park

Program Assistant

Each year numerous volunteers are needed for a variety of programs throughout the park district. From Outdoor Skills, Environmental Education, Interpretation of the Manor House.

Program Assistant - Outdoor Skills

Assist staff during fun outdoor adventure programs. Whether you like archery, paddle sports, fishing, or snowshoeing, Metroparks has an opportunity for you.

Public Relations and Administration

Information Table Host

Help Metroparks get the word out! Hosts are needed to staff information tables at area festivals, public events and at Metroparks.

Mascot Corp

Appear at Special Events in the park and in the community as Otis the Oak Leaf, Owlberta the Barred Owl, or Boggs the Leopard Frog. Must be at least 18 years of age and have an outgoing personality. Mascot Handlers, who speak and interact with the public during a Mascot appearance, are also needed.

Scouts

For decades, local Scout Programs have completed service projects in the Metroparks as part of the requirements for advancement throughout their program. Projects range from building boardwalks and bridges, to native planting and invasive species removal.
