MONDAY

FRIDAY

Cloud Tracing: Clouds might look nice and fluffy, but they really aren't solid at all! Clouds are made of small water crystals in the sky. These crystals can be arranged in the sky in many different shapes and heights, forming the different types of cloud shapes we can see. In the activity below, you can try your hand at making cloud shapes.

Materials: Aerosol Shaving Cream, A Flat Surface (ex. Countertop, Cookie Sheet, Serving Tray)

Find a flat surface that can be easily cleaned afterwards, countertops or serving trays work well. Carefully, spray some shaving cream onto the surface and begin to spread it with your hands. Using this unconventional art medium, begin tracing some cloud shapes in your shaving cream. You can copy cloud shapes below, look at the clouds in the sky today, or get creative and make up your own cloud designs.

Cumulus Clouds are big, puffy white clouds. They form low in the sky and look like a clump of cotton balls.

Cirrus Clouds are thin, long strands of clouds. They can occur at any height and look like wispy and light
