FRIDAY

Paper Plate Snake Craft:

Materials: 2 paper plates, 1 container of green paint, 1 rectangle piece of bubble wrap, glue, scissors, 2 googly eyes, 1 2ft. piece of thread, 1 1-2in., piece of red construction paper (this will be the snake's tongue).

- Paint the plate: Take the rectangular piece of bubble wrap and wrap it around a pencil or your hand. You
 might need a glue dot or tape to secure it in place. Dip the bubble wrap into the paint on the paper plate
 palate. Spread the paint around on the piece of bubble wrap. Next stamp your bubble wrap on the back
 or front of the plate evenly coating the entire plate surface in dots. These are your snake's scales! Set
 aside to let dry for a couple of hours.
- Cut the plate into a spiral: After the paint has dried completely, take your scissors and cut your painted plate into a spiral. You might need a parent's help! Leave a rounded "head" at the end of the spiral. Now you have created your snake's body!
- Glue eyes onto the snake's head: Next, use glue to stick the eyes on your snake's head. Yay! Your snake can see!
- Make and attach the snake tongue: Now, take your scissors and cut a triangle out of one end of your
 red, rectangular piece of construction paper. Put a dot of glue on the other end of the "tongue" and
 stick it to the back of the snake's head.
- Make your snake move: Last, take the 2ft long piece of thread, and tie to the top of your snake's head. Now, your snake is alive! Have fun with your new pet snake!
